

Start a conversation about being generous in your family.

- If your kids get an allowance, ask if they would like to donate part of it. If they say yes, ask them how they feel about their choice.
- During spring cleaning, talk about why you donate your gently used clothes and ask if your kids want to too.
- Next time you forego buying something you wanted, tell your child. Mention what you'd rather do with the money.
- Volunteer for a cause, and talk about why you want to spend your leisure time helping others.
- Talk about why you wanted to spend your vacation helping others in Guatemala.
- If you sponsor a student, talk as a family why you are doing this and why it's important.

Studies show that sharing with others makes you happier and healthier. Research has also shown that having a generous attitude improves the immune system, extends lifespan, and acts as an antidote to pain.

You can help foster a lifetime value of generosity in kids with your actions and words. Look for opportunities to teach generosity (in many forms) within your family, and show your children the joy that comes from giving.



HOW TO ACCOMPAND Ideas for Adults and Families

- Organize a party to share stories about your trip and get your friends involved. Set a goal, such as sponsoring a student.

Ideas for Students

- Fundraise with a carwash, spaghetti dinner, or pancake breakfast.
- Start (or join) a club at your school to raise awareness about poverty and education in the developing world.
